**Preceeded by a short history of the events leading up to
the formation of the Association.**

HISTORY OF THE MOVEMENT.

The movement to commemorate in some suitable manner the signing of the Peace Treaties between the Five Tribes of Plains Indians and the U. S. Government, which took place in late October, 1867, near the site of the present city of Medicine Lodge, was started by a group of Medicine Lodge citizens in 1917. At that time it was planned to hold a semi-centennial celebration, and an organization was formed and committees selected for that purpose. A bill asking for an appropriation was introduced in the Kansas legislature by Senator Price, and one was prepared by Senator Curtis for introduction in the National legislature. With the entry of this country into the World War, which occurred about that time, the committee felt that the resources of the nation could be employed to better advantage than in building memorials, and the project was dropped for the time being.

The matter was taken up again in the Fall of 1925, by some of the citizens responsible for its inception eight years before. The American Legion became interested, and appointed a committee to look into the matter, and the Legion Auxiliary took similar action. In the Spring of 1926, these various committees and individuals decided to form one organization.

On March 11, 1926, a meeting was held in the home of Mrs Geo. Hibbard, at which the following were present:-

At this meeting, it was decided to form a committee to be known as The Medicine Lodge Indian Peace Treaty Memorial Association. John C. Best was elected temporary chairman, and Mrs Geo. Hibbard elected temporary secretary.

It was felt that the first thing to do was to ascertain definitely where the Treaties had been signed. Mrs Hibbard reported that Sergeant I-See-0, one of the surviving members of the Kiowa Indians who had been present on the occasion, had written stating that he could locate the spot and was willing to come from Fort Sill, Okla. and give the committee all necessary information. Mrs Hibbard was requested to write and ascertain what I-See-0's expenses would be.

Mr Groom stated that there was an old fund of about \$60.00 in the Home State Bank, left from some previous Fourth of July celebration, and Mr Chapin was requested to obtain the consent of the Lion's Club to the taking of this fund to defray in part the expense of bringing I-See-0 to Medicine Lodge. Mr Chapin was also appointed to locate the exact

boundaries of the old Stockade, built to protect the citizens of Medicine Lodge from roving bands of hostile Indians.

On March 22nd, 1926, the committee met at the home of John C. Best, and decided to accept I-See-O's offer to come to Medicine Lodge and locate the spot where the Treaties were signed.

On April 5th, I-See-O, accompanied by an interpreter, his nephew, George Hunt, and the latter's wife, Mrs Hunt, reached Medicine Lodge. They brought with them many interesting photos and documents, including the old tribal records of the Kiowas, kept in the form of picture writings, and showing among other things the attendance of the Tribe at the Peace Council in 1867. They said the Indian name for Medicine Lodge was "Ay- y'addle -d'ah", meaning "Timber Hill Mountain. Before inspecting the country, I-See-O told the committee his recollection of the topography of the country where the Treaties were signed. He said it occurred in a grove of tall elm trees, on the north bank of the Medicine, and east of a stream coming into the Medicine River from the north, which latter stream ran down a valley heavily wooded with elms and cottonwoods. This narrowed the investigation down to a very few points, but desiring to investigate the matter impartially, the committee, accompanied by the Indians, visited all points on the Medicine where any

any streams entered on the north. It was not until the party reached the confluence of the Elm and the Medicine however, that the surroundings began to look familiar to I-See-O. Finally he located the exact spot on the farm at present owned by Dan Stone, perhaps 3/400 yards southwest from the concrete bridge on South Main St., Medicine Lodge, over Elm Creek. The elms had been cut down, but their massive stumps still remained, and looking across the River, the committee found that I-See-O's description was correct; from the grove that he located, one peak alone of the Gyp Hills could be seen about 5 miles away.

During succeeding days, I-See-O located the point higher up the river on the farm now owned by H. W. Skinner, where the distribution of supplies had taken place after the signing of the Treaties; the point where the Cheyennes had camped; the location of the old Sun Dance of the Kiowas, and other interesting points. He stated that the soldiers had camped on rising ground in the southwest portion of what is now the city of Medicine Lodge, near the Carrie Nation home. Pictures were taken of these various points, and an affidavit secured from I-See-O and witnessed by all members of the committee. This affidavit, and an interesting account of the Council given by I-See-O and taken down in shorthand and later transcribed by Rachel Nixon, are among the records of the committee.

Having found that Medicine Lodge was practically on the site of the Council, and therefore rightfully entitled to celebrate the event, the committee held another meeting on May 5th, and decided to ask various organizations in the City to appoint representatives on the committee, which would be enlarged to 14 members. The Monday Afternoon Club, the Lions Club; the City Council, the Community Club and the County Commissioners were each invited to appoint delegates. Sam Griffin was requested to prepare application for a charter, and John C. Best to draw up a set of by-laws for the approval of the organization.

SWORN STATEMENT OF I-SEE-O

CONCERNING THE

LOCATION

OF

THE MEDICINE LODGE TREATY

IN

OCTOBER 1867.

Medicine Lodge, Kansas.

April 7, 1926.

I, the undersigned I-see-o, do under oath make the following statement concerning the location of the signign of the Peace Treaty between the five tribes of plains Indians and the Unites States Government in October 1867, on the Medicine River in Barber County, Kansas, known as the Medicine Lodge Treaty.

That I was present at the said peace treaty as a member of the Kiowa tribe of Indians, and that for a period of about three weeks during the said October while the negotiations were going on, I became well acquanited with the surrounding country.

That the Peace Council met just below the confluence of two streams of water, the one emeing from a northerly direction being slightly smaller and emptying into a larger stream coming

from a northwesterly direction, called the Medicine River. That the stream coming from the northerly direction was heavily wooded with elm trees, and that for some distance above its mouth it passed through a low, swampy, heavily wooded country. That this creek was about the size of the creek, now just east of the present city of Medicine Lodge, Kansas, known as Elm Creek.

That the ground whereon the Peace Council was held was heavily wooded with elm and some cottonwood, That from the location of the Peace Council, could be seen a solitary mountain or great hill some six or eight miles in a Southwesterly direction, called by the Indians A-ya-dolda, meaning Timber Hill.

That there were three locations of Indians on the Medicine River during these treaty negotiations; the first location being the site of the Peace Council; the second being a location some two or three miles above the spot where the Peace Council met; and the third location being some few miles above the first and second location.

That after the Peace Treaty was signed the Indians desiring better forage for their ponies moved about three miles up the Medicine River, and there received annuities and presents from the government.

That the Cheyenne tribe was camped on a third location still farther up the Medicine River, being afraid to bring their families down to the Peace Council, only the men coming down to

attend the same. I recollect stories told by some of these Cheyennes that great droves of turkeys invaded the camp at the above location.

After closely studying the ground from a point below Medicine Lodge City of today up the Medicine River to Sun City, and being uninfluenced by any motive other than a desire to locate the exact place of the signing of the Medicine Lodge Peace Treaty, I unhesitatingly state--- That the Peace Council met just below the Confluence of the two streams of water known as Elm Creek and the Medicine River about one-half mile southwest of the present city of Medicine Lodge, Barber County, Kansas.

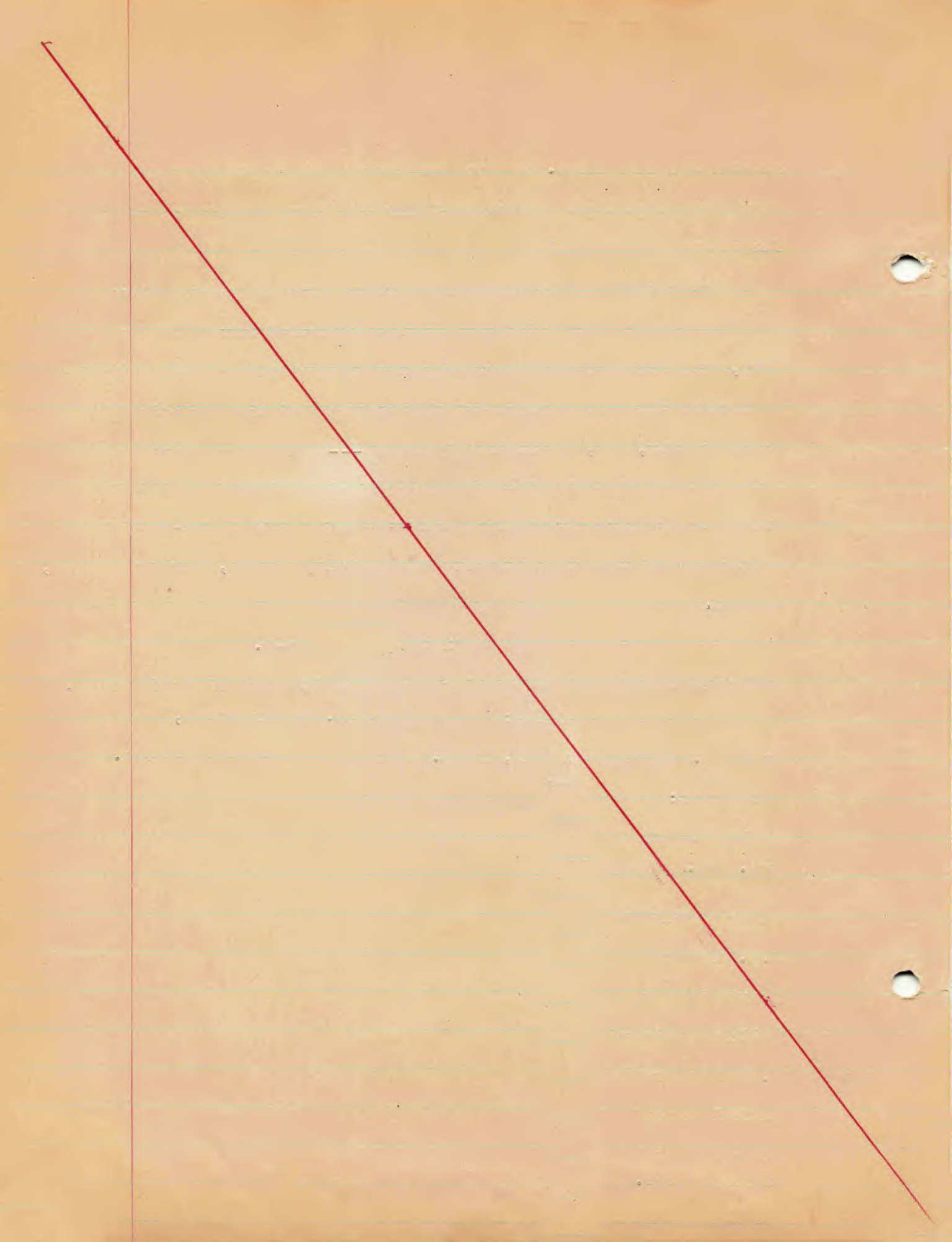

MINUTES OF THE MEDICINE LODGE INDIAN PEACE TREATY ASSOCIATION.

The first meeting of the Association was held June 3, 1926 at the home of Sam Griffin. The Secretary reported that Messrs Griffin, Hinshaw and Chapin had been appointed as formal representatives of the Lions Club; that Riley MacGregor had been appointed as the third representative from the American Legion; Mrs H. W. Skinner as the representative of the Monday Afternoon Club; John A. Munro as the representative of the City of Medicine Lodge; Mrs Blanche Griffin as the representative of the Community Club; Jack Trice as the representative of the Chamber of Commerce, and L. M. Axline as the representative of the Board of County Commissioners. The full membership of the Association is therefore fourteen; consisting of the following:-

All members were present with the exception of L. M. Axline, Riley MacGregor and Mrs Woodward.

On motion properly made and seconded, it was decided that the name of the Association should be the MEDICINE LODGE INDIAN PEACE TREATY ASSOCIATION .

The Chairman reported receipt of communications from Senator Charles Curtis and Congressman Tincher, advising that they would be glad to do all possible to secure a suitable appropriation from the Government for the erection of a monument and an accompanying celebration, and suggesting that the matter be taken up in the fall of the year rather than risking its defeat by trying to put it through in the closing days of the present session. The committee thought this a wise suggestion and instructed the chairman to advise Messrs Curtis and Tincher accordingly.

Samuel Griffin reported that he had written the Secretary of State for Kansas regarding the charter. John C. Best advised that a suggested set of by-laws would be ready to

the next meeting of the committee.

Suggestions were made relative to a campaign for memberships; the appointment of a legislative committee; the issuance of lapel buttons and so forth, but were not made the subject of a formal motion.

The committee adjourned to meet July 13th with Rachel Nixon.

On motion duly made and seconded, it was decided to organize as a membership association, and to file application for a charter as a Corporation organized "not for profit".

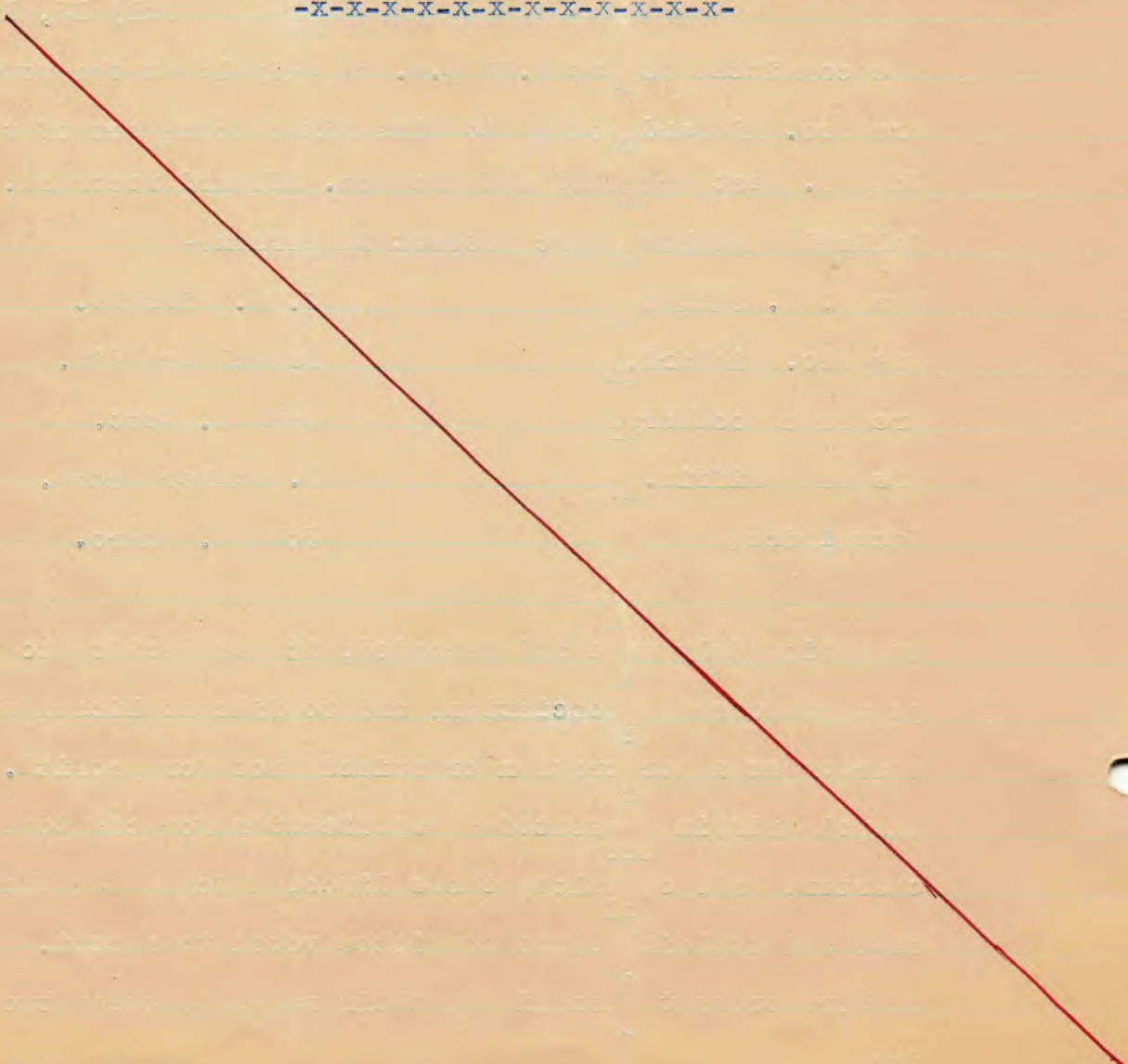

ARTICLE 1.

ARTICLE 2.

| | The Association is organized to secure funds with which to erect a suitable building and/or monument and/or marker to commemorate the signing of the Peace Treaties between the Five Tribes of Plains Indians and the United States Government in October, 1867, at or near Medicine Lodge, Kansas, and for the purpose of preparing plans for and carrying on a celebration in connection with the opening of said building or the unveiling of said monument or marker, in October, 1927. | |
| SEC 2. | The Association is organized not for profit, and the members, directors and officers thereof shall act in the | |

capacity of trustees for such funds as they shall secure, collect or otherwise receive toward the purposes set forth in Sec. 1 of this article.

SEC 3. The Association shall exercise all such powers as it may properly possess under the laws of the State of Kansas, to secure, hold and disburse such funds as may be necessary to attain the objects set forth in Sec. 1 of this article.

ARTICLE 3.

MEMBERS.

DIRECTORS.

SEC 1. Membership in the Association shall be open to all persons, whether residents of Medicine Lodge or not, upon such terms as may be agreed upon by the Board of Directors.

SEC 2. The Board of Directors has the right to create such classes of membership, and upon such terms, as they may see fit.

SEC 3. The property, monies and business of the Association shall be managed by a Board of Directors, fourteen in number. From the time of the granting of the Charter until December 31st, 1927, the Board of Directors shall consist of the fourteen incorporators whose names are attached to the application for charter and to the charter.

SEC 4. The Board of Directors shall have the control and management of the business of the Association, and may exercise all such powers and do all such acts and things

as may be exercised or done by the Association.

SEC 5. A quorum of the Board of Directors shall consist of eight Directors.

SEC 6. In case of sickness or other disability of the President or any of the other officers to serve, their places may be supplied by temporary appointments made by the Board of Directors.

SEC 7. Regular meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held on the Second Tuesday of each month. Special meetings of the Board of Directors may be called by the President, or may be called on the written request of a majority of the Board made to the Secretary.

SEC 8. The officers of the Association shall consist of a President; First Vice President; Second Vice President; Third Vice President; Treasurer and Secretary, who shall hold office until December 31st, 1927, and until their successors are elected and qualify.

SEC 9. Any vacancy on the Board of Directors shall be filled by the organization from which said Director was appointed, or in the case of the failure of said organization to act within thirty days after being requested to do so by the Association, the Board of Directors shall appoint a Director to fill the said vacancy.

SEC 10. All matters coming before the Board of Directors shall be decided by a majority vote of those present if a quorum exists. A lesser number than a quorum shall

have the right to adjourn a meeting to a later date.

ARTICLE 4.

OFFICERS.

SEC 1. The President shall preside at all regular and special meetings of the Board of Directors, and shall perform such other duties as may be devolved upon him by the Board of Directors. He shall exercise a general supervision over the business of the Association and shall be responsible only to the Board of Directors.

SEC 2. The First Vice President shall be vested with all powers, and required to perform all the duties of the President in his absence.

SEC 3. The Second Vice President, and in like manner the Third Vice President shall be vested with all powers and required to perform all the duties of the aforementioned officers in their absence.

SEC 4. The Secretary shall record all the minutes of the proceedings in a book kept for that purpose. He shall see that notice is given of all regular and special meetings of the Board of Directors, and shall perform such other duties as may be required by said Board or by the President. He shall attend to all correspondence of the Association, keeping proper records and copies thereof, and shall have the custody of the minute book, membership book, charter and other documents and records of the Association, except such as

properly belong to the Treasurer.

SEC 5. The treasurer shall keep proper book accounts of the funds handled by the Association; shall report thereon to the Board of Directors at their regular or special meetings, and shall submit his books for audit if ordered by the Board of Directors. A satisfactory bond shall be furnished by the Treasurer in such amount as the Board of Directors may deem adequate.

ARTICLE 5.

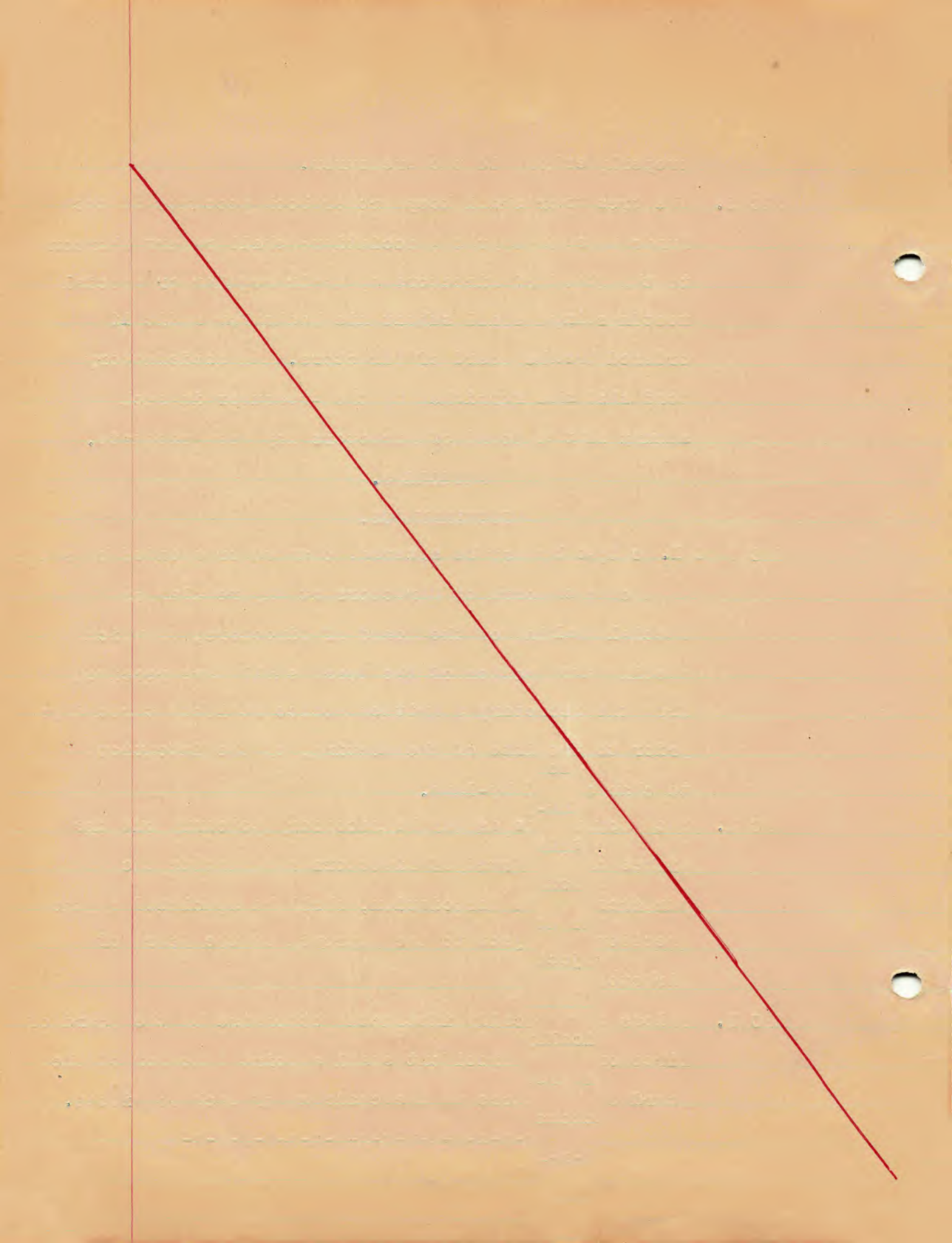
MISCELLANEOUS.

SEC 1. These by-laws may be altered, changed or amended by a vote of the Board of Directors at any regular or special meeting of the Board of Directors, of which meeting each member of the Board shall have received from the Secretary a written notice at least three days prior to the date of the meeting, of the intention to change said by-laws.

SEC 2. Such Committees as may be necessary to carry out the wishes of the Board of Directors and further the purposes of the Association, shall be appointed by the President, subject to the approval of the Board of Directors.

SEC 3. Unless specifically instructed otherwise by the Board of Directors, the President shall appoint a member of the Board of Directors as the chairman of each Committee.
